March on Parks To Start When Vacation Begins

LANSING, June 15.—School days are coming to a close for another year in most municipalities of the state this week and this is expected to signal the beginning of heavy summer attendance at Michigan state parks.

The march on the state's 56 park areas by vacation-bound families may push up to a near-record the number of park visitors, according to the parks division of the department of conservation, in charge of park management.

Open since Decoration Day, parks already have had a big turnout. Before they close on Labor Day, an attendance greater than 1938 is anticipated. An unusually large registration of campers so far this season gives park officials reason to say this.

Good weather and improved economic conditions would strengthen the chance of a bigger participation in park advantages.

Cold weather throughout June and August of the 1938 season held enough people to their homes to drop the total attendance to slightly more than 8,000,000. The 9,700,000 visitor figure for 1937 was the peak in the steady incline the parks have experienced.
