Joseph McCord attended his son as best man. The ceremony was witnessed by clerical and relative of the bridal couple.

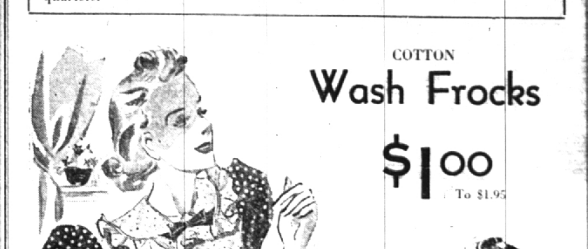
After the wedding, the wedding party was entertained at dinner, held at the Crossways Inn. The wedding cake centered the table, decorated with tall white tapers in silver holders.
