Sportsmen Add To Fish Stock In Inland Waters

MASON, June 21—A county-wide sportsmen's group is preparing to do its bit to add to the fish stock in Michigan inland waters. Three pools in the Ingham county park, located here, are the scene of a bluegill rearing project sponsored by the Ingham County Conservation Club.

Work of preparing the pools for receiving a stock of bluegill breeders in the near future has been carried on under the direction of J. L. Brass, district supervisor, Hastings state fish hatchery. Draining of the pools and seeding and rearing an accumulation of fish—including a pumper that could not be transferred because their carious nature makes them objectionable to lake planting elsewhere—make up the work just completed.

To make way for the bluegills, a total of 40,000 fish were taken from the local pools and 30,400 of them are being deposited in Hutton lake in this county. The take from the park waters, representing a four year production, included 6,000 rock bass, 15,400 sunfish, 6,000 bluegills and 3,000 golden shiners. Weeded out of the lot were approximately 9,000 carp and golden shiners which were taken to the Hastings hatchery for use as fish food.

'Phone Company Aids State In Emergency

Lansing, June 21—The state's fiscal emergency today spurred the Michigan Bell Telephone Company to advance its semi-annual state property tax payment 15 days.

Frank L. Hall, tax attorney for the company, turned over to Auditor-General Vernon J. Brown a check for \$1,520,246.77, representing half the \$3,040,493.54 the Michigan Bell will pay to the state on property taxes for 1938. The first payment, which is due by June 30, was advanced upon a recent suggestion to the Company by the State Tax Commission of a probable state financial emergency before July 1. Final payment on the property tax bill is due on or before October 31.

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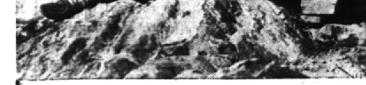
