## Tasty Sandwiches and Cool Drinks As First Aid to Lagging Appetites

A sandwich, dainty and appetizing, a tall cold drink, and a wicker chair can make life very pleasant in the heat of summer. Be sure that the chilled drink is appealing to the eyes as well as to the palate; use colorful and reasonable filling for your sandwiches. They will remain fresh and moist if wrapped in oil paper and placed in a container with a cover. Keep in the refrigerator until needed.

**Fruited Tea**  
2 tablespoons black tea.  
1-2 large can of sliced pineapple.  
3 lemons.  
3 oranges.  
2 cups sugar.  
Steep the tea in 2 cups of boiling water. Strain, add the sugar, mix well and cool. Add lemon juice and orange juice to the tea. Boil the lemon and orange rinds for 15 minutes in enough water to cover them. Strain, cool and add to the tea. Add the pineapple juice. Strain all through a double thickness of cheese cloth until clear. Cut the sliced pineapple in small pieces and add to the punch. Chill thoroughly. Add cherry ice cubes when ready to serve.

**Cucumber and Tongue Sandwich**  
1-2 teaspoon onion juice.  
1 tablespoon minced green pepper.  
1-2 cup cold boiled tongue, minced.  
Mayonnaise.  
Mix all ingredients and add enough mayonnaise to moisten. Spread between thin slices of bread.

**Orange Ginger Ale**  
For each person served combine 2-3 cup of orange juice with 1-3 cup of ginger ale. Pour over ice in a glass and serve.

**Russian Sandwiches**  
Mix 1 cup of cream cheese with 1-4 cup of chopped olives, 1-4 cup of pimiento, and 1-4 cup mayonnaise. Spread on thin slices of buttered brown bread. Put together with a lettuce leaf between them.

**Fruited**  
1 cup apricot puree.  
1 cup water.  
2 cups sugar.  
2 cups pineapple juice.  
3 cups cold green tea.  
1-2 cup lemon juice.  
1-2 cup grape juice.  
2 cups ginger ale.  
Prepare apricot puree by cooking dried apricots in water to cover until they are soft. Rub through a sieve. Combine puree with the water and sugar. Boil until sugar is dissolved. Strain

**Spiced Lemonade**  
2 cups water.  
1 cup lemon juice.  
1-2 cup orange juice.  
4 teaspoons cloves.  
2 cups sugar.  
Mix the water, sugar and cloves. Put over the fire and bring to the boiling point, stirring and boil 2 minutes. Cool. Add water to give desired strength. Serve in tall glasses with cracked ice. Garnish with a whole strawberry.
