

Eleanor Anibal to Become Bride this Afternoon

Couple to Make Home in Ann Arbor After Trip to White Sulphur Springs

Standing before a row of windows, banked with greenery and accented by two wrought iron standards holding white gladioli, stock and larkspur, and two tall white cathedral candles, Miss Eleanor Anibal and Stark Ritchie will speak their vows at 4 o'clock this afternoon, in the living room of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin H. Anibal's home on Lone Pine road. Leading to the white satin pre-dieu will be an improvised aisle, marked off by floor standards of white flowers, wound with ropes of smilax. Spring flowers in pastel tones will be used throughout the house, but the bride's table, in the dining room, will be all in white. Draped in a lace cloth, it will be centered with a huge wedding cake, which will be surrounded with lilies of the valley and encircled with gardenias. At either end will be a crystal bowl filled with white roses, larkspur and lilies of the valley, and further adorned with two silver candelabra holding white tapers. The 100 guests will be served in the garden.

Rev. Dr. William H. Marbach, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Pontiac will perform the ceremony.

Will Wear White Satin

Miss Anibal will wear a gown of heavy white bridal satin, with the white satin pre-dieu, sweetheart neckline and short puffed sleeves. The circular skirt will end in a three-yard train, over which will flow the long veil of illusion, which is to be held in place by a pointed halo of pointed de Vence lace. She will carry a formal bouquet of white orchids, valley lilies and stephanotis.

Miss Nelson Persons of Birmingham, Ala., who was the bride's roommate at the University of Michigan, will be her maid of honor and only attendant. She will be in a sea blue frock of marquisette, fashioned with a high draped bodice, distinguished by rows of pin tucking, and a full skirt ending in a wide ruffle. A picture hat of blue velvet, trimmed with streamers of blue velvet, and a bouquet of Finch roses in delicate pink, lavender buttons and pink gerbera, will complete her costume.

Mrs. Anibal, mother of the bride, will be in a gown of powder blue, the bodice of lace and the full skirt of marquisette. She will wear a corsage of orchids. Mrs. Kramer of Toledo, will serve Mr. Ritchie as best man.

To White Sulphur Springs

Following the wedding, Mr. Ritchie, who is the son of H. T. Ritchie, of Battle Creek, and his bride will leave by motor for White Sulphur Springs on their honeymoon. They will be at home at 151 N. 715 Lawrence street, Ann Arbor.

For her journey costume, Miss Anibal will wear a long linen suit, a felt hat to match and white accessories. She will wear a corsage bouquet of white orchids.
