

Gelatin Is A Hot Weather Delight, Good to Look At and Better to Taste

Foods that look good are far more appealing to the appetite. Gelatin offers rare opportunities of dishes which delight the eye and intrigue the palate. It can be used in practically every course from soup to dessert. In the accompanying recipes are a few of the varied uses of gelatin.

Consomme Madeline
1 quart chicken stock.
1 quart stewed or canned tomatoes.
1/2 cup diced celery.
1/2 teaspoon peppercorns.
1 small bit of bay leaf.
A few cloves.
1 sprig of thyme.
Combine all ingredients and simmer slowly for 10 minutes or longer. Strain through two thick pieces of cheesecloth previously wrung out of hot water. Season highly with salt and pepper. To each quart of consomme add 3 tablespoons of granulated gelatin which has been softened in a small amount of cold water. Stir until thoroughly dissolved in the hot soup. Pour soup into a shallow pan and chill. When ready to serve, cut in cubes and pile in cups.

Pineapple Salad
Soften 3 tablespoons of granulated gelatin in 1/2 cup of cold water. Add 1 cup of boiling unsweetened pineapple juice and stir until dissolved. Add a few units of cayenne pepper, 1/2 teaspoon of salt, 1 cup of pineapple juice, 1 cup of grapefruit juice. Pour into shallow oiled pan and arrange whole drained slices of pineapple in the bottom. Allow to chill and harden. When ready to serve turn out on a chilled board; cut into rounds, with a cutter dipped in hot water. Lay each round on lettuce upon a chilled plate. With a Neapom remove a little of the gelatin from the center of each slice of pineapple. Fill the cavity with cream cheese diluted with pineapple juice. Serve with mayonnaise.

Crabmeat Salad in Lemon Jelly
Soften 1 tablespoon of gelatin in 1/2 cup of cold water. Dissolve over hot water. Add 1 tablespoon of lemon juice, 1/2 cup of boiled dressing, 1 cup of Japanese crabmeat, shredded; 1/2 cup of stuffed olives, chopped; salt and paprika to taste. Mold and chill. Cover a platter with lettuce. Unmold salad on platter and surround with small tomatoes peeled, hollowed and filled with cream cheese moistened with mayonnaise. Toss cucumbers in salad. Garnish with radishes, olives and nut meats.

Peppermint Lime Bavarian Cream
Make 3 packages of lime flavored gelatin in the usual manner. When practically set, beat well

and fold in 6 tablespoons of crushed peppermint stick candy and 2 1/2 cups of whipped cream. Mold. Use as a garnish cherry gelatin, made by using 1 package of cherry flavored gelatin.

Raspberry and Currant Sherbert
Soften 1 tablespoon of gelatin in 1 cup of cold water, add 1/2 cup boiling water, 1 cup of sugar, 1 cup raspberry juice and 1 1/2 cups currant juice. Strain before freezing.

Prune Chiffon Pie
Soak 1/2 pound prunes several hours. Simmer until tender in water in which they were soaked. Let cool. Remove pits and cut prunes into pieces. Measure 1 cup of cut prunes and 1/2 cup of prune liquid. Mash with a fork until soft and smooth. Put in the top of a double boiler with 4 beaten egg yolks, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1 tablespoon of lemon juice. Cook over hot water until thoroughly heated. Remove from heat and add 1 tablespoon of gelatin which has been soaked in 1/2 cup of cold water. Stir until gelatin is dissolved. Let cool until this mixture begins to stiffen. Beat egg whites until very stiff and fold into the stiffened prune mixture. Fill a baked shell. Chill in refrigerator at least 3 hours. Spread with a thin coating of sweetened whipped cream just before serving.

Jellied Jellied Salad
2 cups of canned tomatoes.
1/2 cup water.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
Pepper.
4 whole cloves.
1 tablespoon sugar.
1 small onion.
1 tablespoon gelatin.
1 cup cleaned and diced shrimp.
1/2 cup diced celery.
1 green pepper.
Combine tomatoes, water, salt, pepper, cloves, sugar and onion, peeled and minced. Put over fire and simmer, closely covered for 20 minutes. Strain. Soften gelatin in 4 tablespoons of cold water for 5 minutes. Put into heated tomato juice. Cool. Add shrimp, celery and pepper. Pour into mold. When ready serve on lettuce with cooked dressing.

Chocolate Macaroni Pudding
Soak 1 tablespoon of gelatin in 2 tablespoons of cold water. Add 1/2 cup boiling water and stir until dissolved. Chill and when starting to set fold in 1 pint of cream, whipped. Add 6 well drained macaroni to half of the mixture. Pour into mold and cover with remaining part to which has been added 1 lb. of melted sweet chocolate.
