The owners of the Red Wing Club, Tommy Allen and Bill Denney, attempted to prove they had contracted signed by Sarver to play with them. The case was heard by Judge Charles MacLeod Friday morning.

Bill Baldwin, owner of the Shawnee Club, and Henry Sarver answered the charge of the plaintiff by contending that Sarver was under contract to the Shawnee Club at the time he signed the Red Wing contract and that the Red Wing club knew this and that duress (threatened violence) was used in securing

Maroons Lose Chance To Enter State Tournament

St. Benedict's Scores On Tie Friday Gives Cagers Overtime Play And Final Victory

The Birmingham basketball team was eliminated from the state tournament in the regionals Saturday at Pontiac by St. Benedict's of Detroit 34-30. A fast moving contest in which the winner was not determined until the closing minutes of play.

Although St. Benedict's stepped off to an early lead by sinking two free throws and three field goals for an 8-1 lead, Birmingham out the lead to five points at the end of the first quarter, the score being 12-7.

Birmingham played its best ball of the evening in the second quarter, a fast-forming zone to a close checking man-to-man all over the floor which completely upset the Birmingham team and paved the way for the two intercepted passes which accounted for two St. Benedict's baskets.

After gaining a seven point lead, St. Benedict's once more shifted back to a fast forming zone, and by using their inability to connect on long shots and also follow-ups, it retained its lead as the third quarter ended, with the score 20-23.

In the final quarter the scoring was about equal. St. Benedict's completed eight points in Birmingham's seven. Both coaches used their reserve strength in the closing minutes.

A total of 26 personal fouls were committed, Birmingham being charged with 11 and St. Benedict's 15. Birmingham received 13 free throws and made nine while St. Benedict's compiled a close to perfect record in making ten out of 11 attempts from the foul line.

Don Upward played his last game for Baldwin high school and turned in an excellent performance as he scored eight points on offense and played an excellent defensive game. Coach Whitney switched Upward to forward in the first half of the game in order to capitalize on his scoring.

Hefferman was outstanding for St. Benedict's as he sank six field goals from his guard position.

ART CLASSES WORK ON SETS FOR PLAY

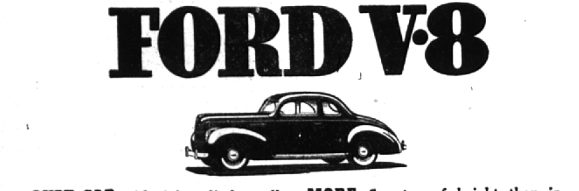
Stage settings for the high school play "You Can't Take It With You," are being planned by the art department this week.
