**PONTIAC**—Among the Michigan State athletes awarded athletic letters in a list of awards given out Sunday by Athletic Director Ralph Young, are two Pontiac boys, Richard Brown and Charles Scribner, members of former Chief's swimming teams, received minor swimming awards.

**ROYAL OAK**—Dr. C. H. Benning, district health officer, today urged vaccination against smallpox for all persons who have not been immunized or those whose vaccinations occurred over five years ago.

The occasion for the warning was the discovery of a case of smallpox in Pleasant Ridge. Three children in that family were found to have had the disease without knowing it. Throughout the state, 147 cases have been reported since Jan. 1, an increase over last year, he said.

For those who cannot afford vaccination from a private physician, the health office at 111 South Troy street offers the service and free of charge. Saturdays, 9 a.m. to 11 a.m.

**Coach Tells Names Of Baldwin Cagers To Receive Letters**

Coach Franklyn Whitney has announced the names of Baldwin school players who will receive their letters for basketball for the season just concluded. Birmingham had a record of 12 victories in 14 starts during the regular season, defeating Rochester and Yale for the district championship. Visitation of Detroit was the first hurdle in the regional play-offs. This game went into overtime with Birmingham winning in the end. Birmingham was eliminated in its next contest by St. Benedict's.

Those players who will receive letters are as follows: Rolland Langerman: Graduated at school. Led all point scorers up to graduation with 73 points in eight contests. A three-letter letterwinner with 117 points in track, also. One of the most consistent point scorers ever to graduate from Baldwin, records show.

Don upward: A senior who graduates in June. Although primarily a defensive player, Don managed to score at least one point in every contest. His season total was 55 points. Three-letter letterwinner, basketball and captain of this year's basketball team, also letterwinner in baseball.

Lorne McDonald: Also a senior, letterwinner in basketball and captain of the basketball team. Second highest in point scoring during the regular season with 91 points. A three-letter man, he scored the tying points in the last three contests of the Visitation game which ended in a tie.

John McDonald: A junior in school. Led all other players in the squad in point scoring with 101 points. Set scoring record in district games with Yale in which he scored 21 points. Also scored 18 points in the last game of the season.

Warren Dalley: A senior who graduates in June. Although this season was his first as a regular, his play during the latter part of the season and the playoffs was outstanding, records reveal.

Dick Gilbert: A sophomore, new to Baldwin this year, coming from California. Played on the first squad only the latter part of the season, but scored 41 points.

George Austin: A sophomore. Played off and on during the regular season as a replacement for Langerman. Scored 23 points during the regular season.

Ray Prevo: A sophomore who played both guard and forward during regular season. Prevo is about six feet tall, and has shown a competitive spirit with possibilities.

Bill Merrill: Regular guard throughout the season. A sophomore.

Sheldon Olson: Advanced to the first team about mid-season. Played guard position during latter part of season.

John McMurdy: Smallest player on a team which averaged six feet to a man. This is his first year in Baldwin. He comes from Pennsylvania.

Ray Trimmer: Also will receive a letter as manager. This was his second regular season with the squad.
