CLUB HEARS TALK ON PROBLEM OF INDUSTRY TODAY

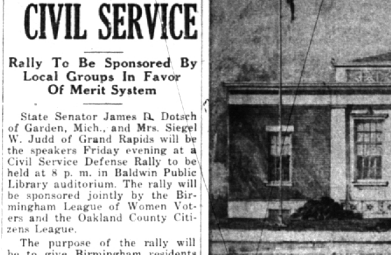
