The Detroit Symphony Orchestra's silver jubilee season will be brought to a triumphant close in Orchestra Hall with three concerts of March 16, 17 and 18. The popular-priced program, March 18, will be the last concert ever to be played by the orchestra in Orchestra Hall for, beginning with the 1939-1940 season the symphony will play all of its concerts in its new home, Masonic Temple.
