

Dancing as Career To Be Talk Topic In School Program

As the third in the series of career lectures for students, arranged through the cooperation of the high school faculty, the American Association of University Women and the Y.M.C.A., Miss Olga Fricker of Detroit, will speak on "Dancing as a Career" at 10:15 a. m., May 16, at Baldwin high school.

Miss Fricker's eminence in her field is from a professional as well as an artistic standpoint. She has studied in Europe and America. In 1925 she joined the staff of the Pontiac school as assistant dance instructor to Madame Cassin. In 1931, she opened her Detroit studio. She was invited by the Detroit Symphony society in 1935 to arrange a dance program with the symphony and since then she has appeared annually with the symphony.

The members of her concert group are selected from the advanced classes of the school and enjoy the privilege of scholarship seasons, as well as the opportunity of dancing on professional programs arranged by Miss Fricker. Recently two of her students appeared in popular Broadway productions and with the Metropolitan Opera company in New York.

Thomas Woodward, art instructor at Wayne University and Vaughn school, will speak on "Careers in Art" Tuesday at 1 p. m., at the Baldwin high school, under the same auspices.

Baldwin Men Lose 3rd Meet in Row, To Cranbrook

Although it lost its third successive meet, the Birmingham high school track team gained more points than in any previous meet, when it lost 59-45 to Cranbrook tracksters on the latter's field Tuesday afternoon.

Hopes for future wins reached a new high as sophomores and juniors, whose faces few knew, took seconds and thirds consistently.

Armstrong and Daley grabbed seconds in the high hurdles in this year's best time.

Hanel was placed in the 440 for the contest instead of the mile run and took second with Baldwin just behind. Estis, for Cranbrook in this event, nearly broke their school record by virtue of his 3:31.1 against a high wind.

Wade and Pilkington tied in the pole vault for the locals at 10 feet. This is the first time Wade even reached that height in a meet, but he took a third in the Pontiac meet at nine feet three inches.

Especially impressive was Gilbert's leap of 20 feet one-quarter inch. Previous to Tuesday his best jump was 19 feet 2.5 inches.

However, Gilbert took second as Martin of Cranbrook sailed away for 20 feet 7 1/2 inches, which was too much for the Malay Leaf.

Incidentally, Martin is under the tutelage of Frank McCarthy, Birmingham's track coach, and his graduation last June.

Other surprise place winners for the local squad, included Richardson, third in the 100; Foley, third in the 220; Longwell, third in the half mile and Watson, third in the mile.

Daley, Spohr, and Billings tied for first in the high jump, sweeping the event at five feet even.

Birmingham's next meet will take place at Ferndale Friday in what promises to be a stiff battle.
