

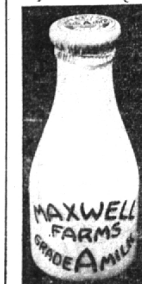
School Set Takes Social Spotlight With Dinners Before May Party

Child Development Authority to Talk To Church Women

Birmingham Council of Church Women will hold a dessert luncheon at the First M. E. church, next Thursday, May 18, at 2:30 p. m. Speaker of the day will be Miss Mary Sweeney, of the Merrill-Palmer school, Detroit, who will give a report on the Matraa conference.

Miss Sweeney is at present assistant director of the Merrill-Palmer school and heads the work in physical growth and development. She was educated at Transylvania college, University of Kentucky and Columbia university. Her teaching experience began with grade school work and continued through a apprenticeship in nutrition and physiological chemistry at the University of Kentucky. When a department of home economics was established at the university in 1913, she was made its head.

During the war Miss Sweeney first served on the Kentucky Council of Defense, then in Washington as chairman of home economics in the United States Food administration. In 1918-19, she went overseas as a canteen worker with the E. F. in France and the Army of Occupation in Germany. She was cited for bravery in the United States Army and the eight-second division on the Meuse Argonne and St. Mihiel fronts.

After the war Miss Sweeney returned to her work as Head of the Home Economics Department at the University of Kentucky. In 1929, she went to Michigan State college as dean of home economics, a group of her students there became the first students of the Merrill-Palmer school. Since 1925, she has been on the staff of the Merrill-Palmer school, where, as head of the physical growth work, she has supervised the physical regime of the nursery school children and directed the instruction of many college women and parents in this field. With Winifred Rand and E. Lee Vincent, she is author of the book, "Growth and Development of the Young Child."

Miss Sweeney has been a president of the American Home Economics association (1920-22), and an honorary vice-president of the Biochemical society. She is or has been a member of the American Chemical society, the American Academy of Political and Social Science, the American Association of University Women, the Home Economics department of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, and the Living Costs committee of the National League of Women Voters.
