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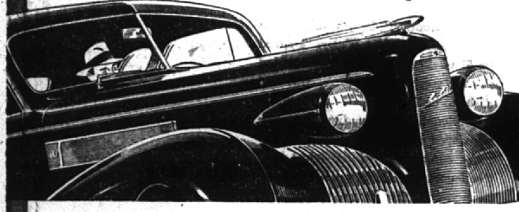
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Cranbrook Teams Bring Honor Home From Cleveland

Cranbrook athletic teams won two contests and lost one on their trip to Cleveland Saturday. The track team was victor in a meet with University School, 70 to 43, and the nine defeated Western Reserve School, 7 to 5. The tennis, soccer, boys, won but one match in their 4 to 1 defeat at the hands of Western Reserve.

Frank McCarthy continued his winning ways in the track meet, which is the first that Cranbrook has won from University School. Besides high jumping 5 feet 10 1/2 inches for a new school record, McCarthy also took first in the broad jump and the 120-yard high hurdles for a total of 15 points. Cranbrook took seven of the 13 firsts, Robert Thompson winning the mile, George Goodman the 200-yard low hurdles, and Howard Estes the half-mile. Bob Bennett, Dave Wiley, and Charles VanFurth tied for first in the pole vault.

Brad Hunter pitched seven of the nine innings against Reserve. He left the game with the score 5 to 4 against Cranbrook, and Dick Strickland, who pitched the last two innings, received credit for the victory. Hunter allowed five hits during his seven innings of play. Cranbrook slammed hit Reserve hurler for 12 hits, including a homer by Bill Mead, three singles by Bud Hunter and a single, double, and triple by Dick Brandt.

Losing 5 to 4 in the ninth, Cranbrook pounded around their runs to put the game on ice. Strickland led the forces down with one hit in their half of the last inning and struck out two men to end the game.

Captain Bill Lowenstein was the only Cranbrook winning tennis against Reserve. The loss is Cranbrook's fifth of the season.

Baldwin Delegation To Attend 'Play-Day'

Feller Perfects Delivery, Steps Out Among Greatest

AT the age when many boys are still cutting campus capers, young Bob Feller is ready to take his place among the great pitchers of all time. So says Del Baker, Detroit manager, of the 20-year-old Cleveland hurler whose early starts this year tend to bear this out.

Feller, according to Baker, should win 25 games this season—just like that. Time was when Feller had only physical ability; now he has taken on the mental poise, which is just as important. The Iowa farm boy also has eliminated the faulty, jerky motion which characterized his delivery in the past. Now he works with a smoother motion that is easier on his arm, and no doubt will lengthen his active career.

Baker contends Feller is as fast as any pitcher who ever took the mound. He also believes the youngster's strikeout total this season will be even more amazing than it was last year—especially since he probably will have a couple of night games in which to work.

Baldwin Thinclads Lose Meet to Hazel Park Team

Meeting Hazel Park high school's track team after the official opening of the Pierce field track, Baldwin high school tracksters lost Friday afternoon by a 62-84 score.

For the second time, however, Birmingham has shown strength in at least five events. These are the hurdles, four and low, 800-yard race, broad jump, and pole vault.

The first four of these Birmingham won Friday.

Tom Allen, who won both hurdle events in the first meet, injured his knee in practice. Consequently, entered only the low hurdle event Friday.

Allen was leading by 15 feet as he approached the last of the 12 hurdles. He hit the one remaining, and fell hard in the cinders, losing.

Frank Armstrong, who placed second to Allen in the initial trial, swept the hurdles events against Hazel Park.

Once again Jim Heibel won the 800-yard run coming down the stretch. He passed three men in the final 30 yards to win in 2:16 1/4 time for his second race.

Pilkington, a sophomore, who placed first in the pole vault in his first encounter at 9 feet 9 inches, won his second place Friday at 10 feet.

Another sophomore, Dick Gilbert, won the broad jump and a second and a third in the 130 yard dash and 220-yard dash, respectively.

The biggest surprise of the day came when Gene Richardson, running his second meet, took a third in the 100-yard dash and a second in the 220.
