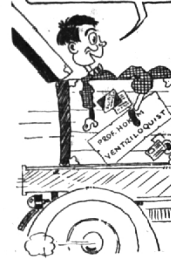
Chiffon is also being trimmed with linen this season—solid color linen fashioning lapels and belt on a printed chiffon frock.

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A Knowledge of How to Prepare Food Is Imperative for Maid and Hostess

Carelessly prepared meals are expensive as well as a menace to health. Every housekeeper should know the art of cooking, and if she fails in this she cannot expect the cook in the kitchen not to appear failures. Therefore, it behooves her to show intelligent interest in food and its preparation.

Chicken a la King
3 cups of chicken cut in rather large pieces.
2 cups mushrooms, sliced
4 tablespoons fat
4 tablespoons flour
1 cup chicken stock
1 1/2 cups top milk
1 1/4 cup chopped, pimento
2 egg yolks
Place the skin and bones of the chicken in a kettle and cover with cold water. Cook slowly for 1-2 hour. Strain.

Cook mushrooms in the 4 tablespoon of fat until a delicate brown. Add flour and mix until smooth. Add chicken stock and milk. Cook, stirring constantly until done. Add chicken and chopped pimento. Heat thoroughly. Pour chicken mixture over beaten egg yolks and mix well. Serve in patty shells, or on toast or waffles. Serve with a vegetable salad, hot rolls and lemon ice.

Baked Liver Loaf
1 pound beef liver
1 cup dried bread crumbs
2 tablespoons melted margarine
1 beaten egg
Salt—pepper—paprika
2 tablespoons minced onion
1 1/2 cups hot water
Pour some boiling water over

Cinnamon French Toast
Make a batter by mixing 2 eggs, 1-2 cup sugar, 2 cups milk, 1 tablespoon of cinnamon. Dip slices of bread in this, then in flour. Fry in deep fat. Serve hot with jelly.

Sunday Morning Coffee Cake
Cream 1/4 cup of shortening and 1 cup of sugar. Add the well beaten yolks of 2 eggs. Sift together 1 1/4 cups of flour, 2 teaspoons of baking powder and 1/2 teaspoon of salt. Add this mixture alternately with 1/2 cup of milk to the egg mixture. Fold in the stiffly beaten whites of 2 eggs. Pour into a well greased baking pan and sprinkle the top with 1/4 cup of sugar and 1/2 teaspoon of cinnamon mixed. Top with pecan chips. Bake in an oven 375 degrees for 30 minutes.

Stuffed Tomato Salad
6 medium sized tomatoes
2 cups finely shredded cabbage
3/4 cup diced unpeeled fresh cucumber
2 tablespoons diced green pepper
1 teaspoon minced onion
Salad dressing to moisten
Peel and cut a slice from the top of each tomato. Remove the inside pulp, sprinkle with salt and turn upside down to drain. Drain the removed tomato pulp and mix with the cabbage, cucumber, pepper and onion. Add enough salad dressing to moisten. Fill the tomatoes, heaping generously. Serve individually on lettuce surrounded by well seasoned cottage cheese. Serve with hash browned potatoes.

Coconut Jumbles
2 eggs well beaten
1 1/4 cups sugar
1 cup heavy sour cream
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 cups shredded coconut
3 cups cake flour measured lightly after sifting once
1/2 teaspoon soda
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
Beat sugar gradually into the eggs. Continue beating until light. Add sour cream, vanilla and coconut. Sift remaining dry ingredients together. Combine mixture. Beat until smooth. Drop by teaspoonfuls on a greased baking sheet, keeping the spoonfuls 2 inches apart because they spread in baking. Bake in an oven 400 degrees for 12 to 15 minutes.
