Mrs. Marc T. Patten, general chairman of the affair, has named several assistants. Mrs. W. D. Thompson is chairman of the Hills Gardens, while Mrs. C. W. Burton will serve in a similar capacity in Palmer Woods. Mrs. John T. Shaw, hostess chairman, has enlisted the aid of the most prominent garden lovers in the district to receive and guide visitors and give information at the various gardens. Mrs. John L. Morely and Miss Romayne Thompson are co-chairmen of flags and signs, and on the estate committee are Mrs. James E. Bereford and Miss Sarah Sly.

Each of the gardens to be seen has been selected by members of the Detroit Center for some outstanding feature which makes it a show place.

Noted Iris Beds

Since the pilgrimage is planned for iris time, visitors at the garden of Miss Addie Sly on West Maple avenue will see what is said to be the finest collection of iris

in this part of the country. Delightful companion plantings further enhance the beauty of the garden. Each iris is plainly marked for the benefit of gardeners who wish to make notes.

The garden of Mrs. S. V. Norton on Lone Pine road is one of great interest to horticulturists because of the choice and unusual plant materials. Casual garden lovers will appreciate the great beauty of this garden and of that owned by Mrs. Ralph L. Polk, Jr., also on Lone Pine road. Here will be found terraced gardens, sloping down to a lake where white swans float.

Two smaller gardens, informally connected with one another, will be shown on West Long Lake road. At the William G. Lerchen home, may be seen terraces and an unusual kitchen garden. Mrs. John W. Watling's garden boasts perennials at the foot of a hill, planted for color harmony and a succession of bloom.

Gardens Adjacent

The William A. Fisher and Alfred J. Fisher gardens in Palmer Woods also adjacent, occupying an entire block and making an estate of great beauty, with great trees and formal gardens. The K. T. Keller garden in Palmer Woods is a perfect example of a small formal garden, used as an outdoor living room, and there is also a larger, less formal garden. Charles W. Burton's garden features lovely borders and roses, as well as a rock garden and a pool.

The privilege of being one of 30 "house guests" at a presidential garden party was accorded to Mrs. Gordon L. Bailey of Hamilton avenue. The affair, which was held at the White House on Thursday, May 18, was given by Veterans' Administration, and was attended by Mrs. Bailey in her capacity as national head of the Forty and Eight of the American Legion Auxiliary.

"House guests," according to Mrs. Bailey, are the guests who

are first received in the White House, before proceeding to the gardens for the reception proper. Among others in the group on May 18 were the Secretary of War, Harry Woodring and Mrs. Woodring, Solicitor General Robert Jackson and Mrs. Jackson, and Mrs. Cordell Hull, Assistant Secretary of War Louis Johnson, who is also past National Commander of the American Legion, and Mrs. Johnson, and Mrs. Edith Bolling Wilson, widow of the late President Woodrow Wilson.

The group congregated in the famous Blue Room of the White House, where Mrs. Franklin Delano Roosevelt, wife of the President, met them. Afterwards, Mrs. Bailey was second to be presented to President Roosevelt, following only Mrs. Wilson.

Having paid their respects to the nation's first couple, the "house guests" took their places in the receiving line, where they greeted others attending the affair. For the occasion, Mrs. Bailey chose a sheer, street-length frock in navy blue, with which she wore a small hat in cranberry shade, and matching accessories.
