Cranes Triumph As McCarthy Breaks Broad Jump Mark

Frank McCarthy broke the broad jump record at Cranbrook School on Saturday, achieving a distance of 21 feet 11 1/2 inches in a track meet with Patterson College of Western Michigan.

McCarthy was higher scorer in the meet, which Cranbrook won, 84-79.

The previous broad jump record was made by Carl Holden in 1938, with a distance of 21 feet 11 inches. McCarthy broke the record in the 120-yard high hurdles and the high jumps. Other outstanding Crane dundells included Bruce Stevens, first in the 100-yard dash, the 120-yard high hurdles and the 220-yard dash; Walter Stecker, winner of the 220, second in the 100 and 200, and the 400; and Captain Woodward Row, winner of the shot and third in the 220 and high jump.

University School of Cleveland also journeyed to Cranbrook on Saturday, to win in basketball and in the diamond center. The basketball game was a close one, ending 23-18, with 8 runs and 11 hits for University; 3 runs and 5 hits for Cranbrook. The victorious battery consisted of Johnnie Eide and George Gottfried. Brad Hunter and Dick Erickson pitched for the losers, with Stewart Peet catching.

The tennis tournament ended 1-1 in favor of the visitors. Wylie Hitchcock scored Cranbrook's lone victory in the singles, defeating Burroughs Brown, 6-0, 6-4, 6-2. Dick Hood, Crane third-former, ranked as number two man for the day, playing a promising game.
