Lead in Every Phase of Game Except Passing

Statistics on Birmingham's first seven games show that the Maroons have outplayed their opponents in every department except passing.

Coach George Warster's boys have made approximately 1193 yards from scrimmage to 306 for the opposition. They have made 82 first downs to 48 for opponents. In the passing department the Maroons have behind their opponents, having completed 14 passes of 49 yards for a total of 245 yards while the opponents have completed 23 passes of 60 attempted.

The figures also show that Birmingham has scored 122 points to 24 for the opposition, or an average of 18 points a game to three for opponents. They also show that the Maroons have been penalized 50 times for a total of 245 yards and have fumbled eight times and recovered two of those.

The individual records show that Dick Wenzell, Maroon halfback, has gained the most ground, 592 yards for an average of 4.2 yards a try in 78 attempts. Clark Pardee has gained 261 yards in 45 attempts for a 5.8 average per try. "Scotty" Gowans with 231 in 50 tries for a 4.6 average. He has the best average among the regular backs. The other back to gain over 100 yards is Hugh Mack with 127 yards in 38 attempts for a 3.4 average. Highest individual ground gaining honors in one game go to Clark Pardee who gained 97 yards against Dearborn.

Scoring honors go to Dick Wenzell on six touchdowns and four points. He is closely followed by Gowans with 26 points on three touchdowns and one conversion. The other 64 points are scattered among Clark Pardee with 18, Hugh Mack and Bill Hopkins 12, and Ken Kirby and Frank Armstrong with six each.

On the 1939 Birmingham gridiron are 13 seniors, 15 juniors and one sophomore, Dale Ballard. The lightest players are Scotty Gowans and Don Erickson at 135 pounds. Heaviest player is Raymie McBride, regular center, who tips the scales at 187 pounds. The records also show that seven players, Jim Herbst, Raymie McBride, Lawrence Colgrove, Ted Snyder, Horace Cole, Dick Wenzell and Clark Pardee have been in the starting lineup in all seven games to date.
