P.-T. A. Invites Public To Attend Series of Child Health Talks

The program committee of Holy Name Parent-Teacher Association is sponsoring a series of public health lectures beginning Monday, Nov. 13, at Barnum School, at 8 p. m.

This series is similar to one that was held in the Barnum School 15 years ago. It will include two lectures in November on Care of Mother and Infant, and Infant Feeding, the first on Nov. 13. The other two will follow: "Min Blaine, Eye Ear Nose and Throat Care, Mental Hygiene, Nutrition and Diet, Dental Care, Communicable Diseases and Home Hygiene."

All these lectures will concentrate on child health to 12 years, and Barnum school was selected as it has a central location.

Dr. A. K. Stolman will give the first lecture, Nov. 13, and Dr. Vida H. Gordon, of the Michigan Department of Health, will follow the second, Nov. 27. Dr. Gordon will use moving pictures.

The chairman of this series is Mrs. H. H. Corson, and she has had the assistance of Dr. W. Lloyd Kemp, chief health officer, Miss Blaine Brackley, Miss Emma Christians, Miss Dorothy Neilson, visiting nurse, the Board of Education, and the Red Cross services.

This course is free and it is hoped that every adult in the community interested in infant and child health care will attend the seven or eight lectures in this series.

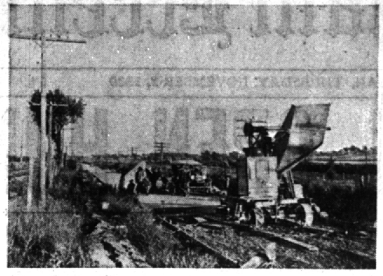
