Dr. J. Z. Urburu of Argentina will address the Pan American League members and their guests at the International Center, Detroit, Friday evening at 8 o'clock.

Dr. Urburu, who is in Detroit on a special mission for the Argentine government, is a noted diplomat and international lawyer. He is the nephew of General Urburu, president of Argentina, 1930-1932, and a grandson of the first president who wrote the provisional laws for Argentina.

Ann Arbor Professor To Be Guest Speaker At Joint P.-T. A. Meeting To Be Held Monday

Dr. George E. Carrothers, professor of Education and director of the Bureau of Cooperation with Educational Institutions at the University of Michigan, will be the speaker at the joint meeting Monday of the Quarton and Adams Parent-Teachers' associations which is to be held in the Adams School.

Using as his topic "The Community and Educational Changes in How Birmingham Can Have the Best Schools in Michigan," Dr. Carrothers will speak to the combined groups from Adams and Quarton schools. Dr. Carrothers' many professional activities include his being assistant superintendent of Cleveland schools from 1919 to 1923; professor of education in Miami and Ohio universities, dean of Rollins College for two years and teacher in Ohio State University, Western Reserve University, University of Michigan and other colleges. He has taught in Indiana high schools for three years and was division superintendent of schools and director of academic division, bureau of education in the Philippines for four years.

During the time spent in the Philippines Dr. Carrothers traveled over a considerable portion of the islands. He learned to speak the Visayan language and came into close contact not only with the pupils in their schools but with the parents in their homes and in their community gatherings.

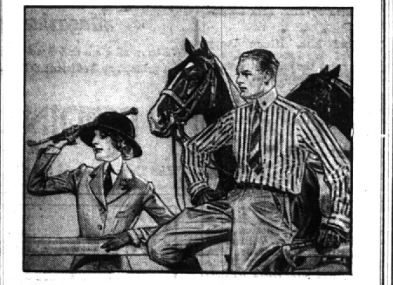
