Books Depicting 'Nazi Nightmare' Discussed by Olive Deane Hormel

Our great obligation in the struggle between Democracy and Fascism is to keep our balance and to base our judgment of issues on reason and logic and not on emotionalism. Miss Olive Deane Hormel stated Monday afternoon in her lecture "The Nazi Nightmare," the second in the series of contemporary literature and drama offered by the University of Michigan Extension Service and sponsored at Cranbrook by the Oakland and Pontiac Branches of the American Association of University Women and the Oakland County Federation of Women's Clubs.

Miss Hormel said to go directly to the Nazi literature itself since its flavor cannot be given in any resume. For this reason, she outlined the first two chapters and those on propaganda and organization. Also recommended is "The Nazi Primer," an exact translation of the pamphlet which was compulsory reading for some seven million German youth, and which gives the principles of Nazism in the words of the Nazi leaders, condensed from "Mein Kampf."

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For a brief but thoughtful insight into the Nazi literature recommended Philip Gedulla's "The Hundredth Year," which in addition to a graphic picture of the reoccupation of the Rhineland, relates other significant and moving events of 1938. Gedulla's book begins with the death of George V and the ascension of Edward VIII and ends with the end of the war in 1939. It is a picture of a new epoch of uncertainty and upheaval which history has yet to name.

The issue, however, is quite different. It is the issue of the "Fourth Dimension" by Vladimir Poliakoff ("Augur"), which sets the fourth dimension as the spiritual issue, transcending the usual more important issues of geography, politics and economics. However, neither Poliakoff asserts, "tradition and interest are not the only factors in politics. We have to take into account the Higher Conscience, too. The issue in Europe today is just that: people there are recognizing the eternal code, while others claim that man-made laws alone shall prevail."

Among background books for the present conflict, the lecturer recommended particularly "Germany and England: Background of Conflict" by Raymond J. Sontag, as a keen and readable history of what has happened in Europe in the past few years. He suggested Victor Michels Dea's "Europe in Retreat," and for the next year, Raymond Gram Swing's "How War Came."

Helpful also, Miss Hormel stated, in giving insight into conditions, character are personal narratives, such as Nora Waln's "Reaching for the Stars," Madeline Kent's "I Married a German," and "Escape to Life" by Erika and Klaus Mann; and such books as "The Story of the War" by Passon's "Days of Our Years," Vincent Sheehan's "Not Peace But a Sword," and G. E. Gedy's "Betrayal in Central Europe." These should be read in combination and balance with each other, she added, so as to safeguard ourselves against the prejudices of individual writers.

In classifying and listing the best of the multitude of books dealing with various phases of the Nazi threat to liberty and democracy which have been published in the past fifteen months, the lecturer had to exclude a large number from the list any books which bore the earmarks of propaganda and did not contain legitimate information, using as a guide "The Fine Art of Propaganda," issued by the Institute of Propaganda Analysis. She recommended this book as a valuable reference.
