Bartlett and Robertson, Famous Duo Pianists, Scheduled to Play in Birmingham, Feb. 27

A concert distinguished for its novelty and for its musical interest is that of Ethel Bartlett and Rae Robertson who will present one of their famous two piano recitals as the final concert in a series of three which is to be given by the Birmingham Musicale during the winter months. The Ypsilanti Normal Choir will inaugurate these concerts with a performance here Dec. 8.

Ethel Bartlett was born and educated in London and comes of a musical family. She studied at the Royal Academy of Music with Frederick Moore and Tobias Matthay and later coached in Berlin with Arthur Schnabel.

Miss Bartlett also has a reputation for herself in chamber music and besides quintet, quartet and trio work, was at one time associated with John Barbirolli, conductor of the New York Philharmonic Symphony Orchestra, in cello sonata recitals.

Mr. Robertson was born in Scotland and cannot remember the time when he did not play the piano. During the "lean" years he toured as a pianist with the Russian Ballet, playing the piano parts in "Petrouchka" and "The Three-Cornered Hat," and later appeared at the Savoy Theatre as pianist to Karavina when she danced in Barrie's "Truth About the Russian Ballet."

Steadily Robertson and his wife built up considerable reputations as solo pianists and engagements and tours became frequent. Everything was going beautifully except

Dr. Vida H. Gordon Talks to Parents On Children's Care

Dr. Vida H. Gordon of the Michigan Department of Health was the leader of the second meeting in the Child Health series sponsored by the Holy Name P-T.A. at the Barnum School Monday night.

A film "Judith's Diary" showing the value of regularity in the training of all habits pertaining to the care of infants and young children, was shown by Dr. Gordon during the evening. This film loaned by the children's bureau, was prepared by the department of visual education at the University of Wisconsin.

Dr. Gordon urged the importance of breast feeding for infants and the inclusion of cod-liver oil, orange juice or tomato juice; cereals about the fifth month and also strained vegetables. A doctor should be consulted in the feeding of young children, their immunization from disease, and general physical examinations periodically.

The importance of plenty of sleep and regularity of naps, daily bath, play in the sunshine, balanced diet, were repeatedly stressed by Dr. Gordon.

As the child reaches school age, he will be much better able to adjust himself to his new environment, if in addition to these physical cares the parents have developed self-reliance and self-confidence in the growing child Dr. Gordon stated.
