## Child Develops Through Living Speaker Says

"Children develop through doing things and through living," Dr. Robert W. Kelso, director of the graduate school of social work at the University of Michigan told a group that assembled Sunday afternoon at an open house at Sherwood School in Bloomfield Hills.

They learn through the process of play as adults learn through the process of work the speaker said. "You and I," he pointed out, "have been kidding ourselves into thinking that the child of social work. He doesn't—he learns from his contemporaries."

It is only within the last 40 years that educators have discovered the child as an individual. Dr. Kelso said, and progressive schools have been the ones developing the child as an individual.

Dr. Kelso, president of the Sherwood School, is also president of the Citizens' Housing and Planning committee and is Detroit chairman of the Michigan State Housing Commission.
