Hyacinths
Now it's the time to place hyacinths in glass jars. Put a piece of charcoal in the water to keep it sweet. Fill and keep full to the level of the bottom of the bulb. Immerse the glass in a dark room about 50°. After about eight weeks or when the glass is filled with roots and the top growth has reached a height of about 4 inches, bring into sunlight in a room temperature not over 70°.
