Richard Crooks, Famous American Tenor, To Appear in Birmingham on January 26

Richard Crooks, famous American tenor, will appear in Birmingham on January 26 at the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church. Today, ranking among the most popular members of the Metropolitan Opera company, he has won acclaim with the dozen leading roles he has sung at the revered old opera house.

In addition to being one of the outstanding tenors, Crooks is also a fine athlete. He is keen on sports; plays par golf, pilots a plane, and won the New York State Handball Championship on the morning of his New York debut.

Ranking as one of the outstanding American tenors before the public today, Richard Crooks will appear in song recitals at the Baldwin High School auditorium in one of three artist concerts to be presented during the winter months by the Birmingham Musicale.

Mr. Crooks will appear in Birmingham on Jan. 26 and Bartlett and Robertson, duo-pianists will come here Feb. 27. Frederick Alexander's Ypsilon I Normal Choir will open the series with a concert on Dec. 8.

Mr. Crooks, who is nationally known to radio listeners through his weekly broadcasts during the past several years, began his career as a boy soprano soloist at Ocean Grove, N. J., at the age of nine. When the American tenor came to New York City to study he shared a \$5 a week room with four other young men. At the age of 20 Crooks got his first tenor.
