Educator Stresses Change In Teaching Methods at Joint Meeting of P.-T. A.

In his talk on "The Community and Educational Change" at the joint meeting of the Adams and Quenton P.-T. A. held Monday evening at the Adams School, Dr. George E. Carrothers stressed the change in the method of teaching. "Today," he said, "we consider education an unfolding of the child's capabilities rather than a 'pouring in' process. We seek to bring out and develop something that has been given to each and try to find out what each one is individually."

Dr. Carrothers, professor of education and director of the Bureau of Cooperation with Educational Institutions for the University of Michigan, gave as his definition of an educated person, "He who is able to live most efficiently, happily and harmoniously in the community where he is born or in the community where he decides to place himself."

"We must learn to live in harmony with our fellow men," the speaker pointed out, and parents should live with the child and not for him. Nearly all difficulties in
