Two Top Teams Await Final Test For Championship

Next week Friday Nov. 17, Birmingham clashes with the highly rated Ecorse Red Raiders for the championship of the Twin Valley league. The game will be played at the Ecorse home field. Several hundred local fans are expected to attend.

So far this year Coach Cliff March's Ecorse boys have won four, lost one and tied one. They have defeated Wyandot 6-2; Wyandot 20-0; Dearborn 20-0; and Hazel Park 13-6. They have been defeated by the strong River Rouge academy 12-0 and tied by Wayne 0-0.

According to Coach March, Ecorse will have seven lettermen in the starting lineup. Starting lettermen are: left end, left end, Williams; left tackle; Cook, Ecorse captain; right guard; Jones, center; Dingell; right tackle; Ulrich, right guard; and May, right end.

The rest of the starting lineup will include Gosfarf, quarterback; Karmady, left halfback; Cray, fullback; and Billings, right halfback.

Birmingham will probably start the same lineup that has been used recently. Cranbrook Wins League Title

In as brilliant a display of football as has ever been seen on Cranbrook's gridiron, the Cranbrook school defeated a powerful, well-coached team from Shady Side School of Pittsburgh by a score of 14-0. This victory secured Cranbrook the championship of the Interstate Preparatory School League, securing a berth in the circuit.

Coach E. E. Raymond's team also scored a win over Bowling Green (Ohio) High School, giving the Bluefield Hills boys a clean slate to date. Next Saturday they will meet the team from Howe School of Howe, Ind., in Cranbrook's field, and on Nov. 18 they will play Lake Forest Academy of Lake Forest. Hopes are running high at Cranbrook that the team may come through the season undefeated.

The victory over Shady Side was largely the result of the several long passes which were thrown by Don Robinson and which were caught in almost phenomenal fashion by Bill Hudson. These passes brought Cranbrook from a deficit of 20 yard line to a successful score. The point after the touchdown was missed. Shady Side had scored earlier in the game, and the score stood 6-6.

The winning touchdown was made by Dick Brandt, of Birmingham, when he scooped up one of Shady Side's blocked punts and ran 30 yards to score. Bill Hudson converted the extra point.

A homecoming crowd of about 1,000 witnessed the game and roared its approval at the outcome. Big disappointment of the afternoon was that Captain Hank Uhllein, popular fullback from Milwaukee, was unable to stay in the game because of a leg injury which he had suffered in a previous game. He will undoubtedly be ready to take his place against Lake Forest.

Cranbrook's soccer team has not fared so well as the football team, having lost all its league games. Shady Side defeated Cranbrook 1-0 last Saturday. The remaining games on the soccer schedule are Nov. 10, with Chatham Vocational School of Chatham, Ont., and on Nov. 18 with the Akron Indians of Akron, Ohio.

'God Bless America' Given Premiere Here, Victor Lull Reveals

In an interview with Victor Ullrich, vocal music teacher at Baldwin High School, it was disclosed that Birmingham was the first city to hear "God Bless America," the popular song by Irving Berlin.

Mr. Ullrich said that the Methodist Church chorus decided to use it as the closing number on its radio show last February after hearing it introduced on the air. Armistice Day, Nov. 11, 1938, by Miss Kate Smith.

The song at that time had not been published. In response to the request of the chorus, Miss Smith sent manuscript copies of the song. Later when it had been published, she had copies presented to the group by Miss Smith.

Two months later the song was placed on sale. "God Bless America" will be the opening number on the Armistice Day program at Baldwin High School this Thursday.

Indian Symbols Explained by Chief

"On either side of every Indian tepee appears a symbol, a protection against dangers of illnesses," said Chief Black Cloud of the Chippewa tribe, who addressed the group at the formal opening of Hunter Boulevard, Friday night, Nov. 3.

In an interview granted last Friday afternoon, Chief Black Cloud pointed out the symbols appearing on his tent. The hawk, drawn high on the right side, represents speed; the bull over the opening of the tepee, wisdom; the bull on the lower left side serves as a symbol of strength.

At 82 years, Chief Black Cloud has a wealth of memories, most prominent of which is his graduation from Carlisle University some 65 years ago.

For the ceremonies on Friday evening the tepees were arranged on the parkway by the new Hunter Boulevard. They were supposed to represent the dwellings of the Chippewa ancestors of these eleven Indians, who more than 100 years ago were present when the early settlers of Birmingham came down the old Saginaw Trail.
