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## Close Relation of Farm and City Described By Mrs. Arlie Hopkins

Mrs. Arlie L. Hopkins of Bear Lake, Mich., guest speaker before members of the Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Fontaine and Dearborn branches of the Woman's National Farm and Garden Association at the Community House Monday afternoon, talked convincingly of the far-reaching effects of present day strides in bringing city and country women into closer relationship.

Mrs. Hopkins told of her trip in London in June as delegate to the Conference of the Associated Country Women of the World. "When they asked me before this great conference of interested women, what we were doing for our youth in America, I told them of our 4-H club work for boys and girls and of its educational advantages in every phase of living. I told them of the college scholarships for young women sponsored by various farm and garden clubs throughout the country. I told them of the green markets with their constantly increasing opportunities for farm women living in isolated country spots. Such news was welcomed by women from Africa, Latvia, Australia and other countries who seemed most eager for knowledge of advancement for women in America."

Mrs. Hopkins spoke of this great conference of 6,000 women from all parts of the world as an important movement toward world peace. Among the living delegates from America, she told an interesting story of the trip to the Institute of Agricultural Engineering at Borcham through an invitation from Mr. and Mrs. Henry Ford.

Fifty countries were represented with representatives from 87 societies and organizations Mrs. Hopkins stated, with but a single aim—foster living with closer relationship for people throughout the world. These women met in London to compare aims and methods of reaching their goal she pointed out.

Mrs. Hopkins was introduced by Mrs. Lee E. Joslyn, Jr., State president of the association. Mrs. Joslyn introduced Mrs. George I. Rochester, Mrs. Kenzie Smith of the work of the Michigan Horticultural society and of its decision to establish a center in Birmingham as a branch of the Detroit Center.

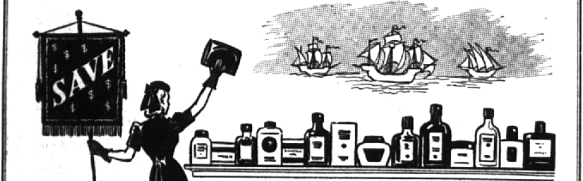
