Opponents Have Won Three and Lost Two Games

Birmingham's football forces will invade East Detroit this Friday afternoon in an attempt to win their sixth game in a row from a tough Shamrock eleven. So far this year East Detroit has won three games and lost two. The team defeated Wayne 50 Hazel Park 13-6, and Van Dyke 21-7, and has kicked 10 goals. Trenton 20-13, and River Rouge 35-6. The chief offensive threat of the Shamrocks is Fred Hollie, first string quarterback with two years' experience. Hollie passes, punts, and runs and has scored 40 points this year. Eugene Bauder is the main receiver of Hollie's passes and is an excellent end with three years' experience. Another star player is Kenneth McDonald, a good running star, and Ed Thayer who plays center and is a sure tackler. East Detroit chooses a field captain before each game just as Birmingham does. Coach Dean Rockwell said that he will probably start the same boys he used in the game with River Rouge last week. This includes Eugene Bauder, left end; Charles Ward, left tackle; Kenneth McDonald, left guard; Ed Thayer, center; Rex Shipley, right guard; Kenneth Conley, right tackle; Henry Garter, right end; Fred Hollie, quarterback; Melvin Tenn, left halfback; John Wunn, right halfback; and Chester Platt, fullback. This lineup averages 155 pounds.

Scoring Spree Levels Ypsilanti; Reserves Shine

The Birmingham Maple Leafs strengthened their hold on first place in the Twin Valley League standings by bombarding the invulnerable Ypsilanti High School 38-0 last Thursday at Pierce Field. For four periods, Birmingham kept Ypsilanti from going beyond the Maroon 49-yard stripe, scored in each quarter, and smothered the Ypsilanti attack. The statistics reveal the superiority of the Birmingham attack. Birmingham's net gain by rushing totaled 196 yards to Ypsilanti's 3. Birmingham gained 45 yards on forward passes and Ypsilanti gained 18 yards. Twenty first downs were registered by Birmingham, while Ypsilanti finished with three. The Maples didn't wait long to score. In the first quarter a touchdown resulted after a 68-yard march ended with Dick Wenzell dashing across the goal line for the eighth time. Gowans' try for the extra point just missed its mark when the ball struck the cross bar and bounded back into the end zone. Two touchdowns in the second period enabled Birmingham to run up 18 yards. Herbert partially blocked an Ypsilanti kick which was downed by the Maples on the Ypsilanti 29-yard line. Five plays advanced the ball to the five yard line from which Pardon plunged across for the touchdown. A bad pass from center led to Birmingham's third touchdown. The pass was intercepted by a player for the fullback, Suggert, on the Ypsilanti 34-yard line. The ball was returned to Birmingham on a 20-yard line. An Ypsilanti Kick at midfield. A few plays later Birmingham scored across for a Birmingham score, from the one yard line. Gowans made the extra point on a kick from placement. The Ypsilanti high point came just before the half ended, when the ball was advanced to Birmingham's 49 yard line on a 18-yard pass from Britton to Shefferd. The advance was halted when Hains intercepted an Ypsilanti pass on the Maroon 37. Birmingham started on another march in the third quarter only to be halted 4 yards from the goal line. At this point, with Ypsilanti in possession of the ball, Quarterback Britton hoped to bring Birmingham napping by calling for a dangerous lateral pass behind the line of scrimmage. But Birmingham's left end, Frank Armstrong diagnosed the play perfectly, catching the ball on ten yard line and scampering for a touchdown. Again Birmingham capitalized on a bit of slip football, when Gowans' try for the extra point was blocked, Wenzell picking the ball out of the air and then lateraling to Gowans who ran across for the score. An entirely new Birmingham lineup was set into the game as the fourth quarter started. The substitutes showed a bit of nervousness at first, but then buckled down to business, scoring two touchdowns in the last five minutes which brought Coach Burgess and his staff to Birmingham regulars to their feet. Ken Kirby darted 14 yards for the first touchdown by Bill Hopkins' 48 yard sprint through the center for the second touchdown by the pony backfield. Both tries for the extra point were bad. The game ended with every one patting the reserves on the back for their fine exhibition. Because of its one-sided victory over Ypsilanti, Birmingham is not overconfident with five wins in a row, as the toughest games are still ahead.

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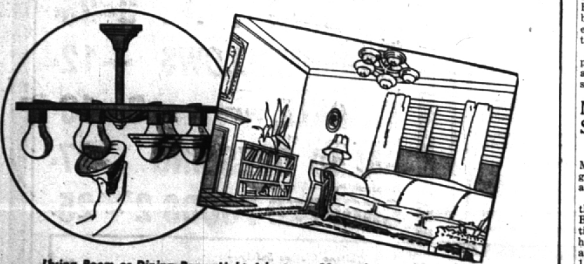
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Cranbrook Leads Prep League
