In addition, a special guidance program has been worked out and will be under the charge of Harry Hoy, and Dean Nickerson, for grades ten through twelve.

School officials have also announced that Cranbrook will continue its membership in the Interstate Preparatory School League, and that the athletic teams will continue their trips to Buffalo, Cleveland, and other nearby cities.

Wiring Is Blamed For Fire in Home On Frank Street

Defective wiring and too-heavy fuses were blamed by Fire Chief Vernon Griffith for a blaze which occurred Sunday afternoon at the home of Everett Lucas, 355 East Frank street.

The blaze started in the Lucas family room, where the wife of the owner saw the smoke and called the department.

Griffith said that the blaze originated in a first-floor water heater and spread to the second floor. Water carried on the trucks was used to extinguish the flames.

Chief Griffith said that he believed the short circuit from defective wiring caused the fire. He added that fuses used were of 30 ampere rating. The department recommends 15-ampere fuses which will burn out quickly before a short circuit can do any damage.

Damage was estimated at \$200 to the building and \$100 for the contents.
