YMCA Basketball Meeting Called

The Birmingham Y. M. C. A. Basketball League will hold an organization meeting at the Community House next Tuesday evening at 7:30 o'clock.

The league will consist of six teams and it is expected several of last year's entries will again participate. Milks Service is expected to again make a strong bid to retain the city championship which they won last year. Birmingham Recreation, Sherman's Market and DeMolay, all strong contenders last year, are also expected to enter teams this year.

Organization of the league is begun early this year to enable the league to finish earlier in the season. The league will be organized to play basketball outside teams in exhibition games and to stage a longer city championship series than was permitted last year.

Team managers, players and any newcomers to Birmingham who desire to play basketball should attend this meeting. Any player living or working in Birmingham or Bloomfield Hills is eligible to sign up with one of the teams in the league. Graduates of Birmingham High School living outside these boundaries are also eligible. The above rules of eligibility have prevailed in all Y. M. C. A. recreational activities during the past several years.

Organization of the league will be conducted by W. C. Morgan, Y. M. C. A. recreational director, F. Hartwell Ladd and D. A. Green who acted as last year's board of control, with Bob D. Lynn, Y. M. C. A. secretary, acting as chairman.
