

No Mud-ee, Sew-ee, No WPA-ee, They Say-ee to Commish-ee

Residents of Rivenoak and Madison avenues, about 38 of them, descended upon the City Hall Tuesday night in response to the Commission's invitation for a public hearing on proposed WPA sewer projects for these two streets. After an hour and a half of open discussion, during which a majority objected strenuously to the need for the sewers, and some opposed the slowness of WPA labor, the Commission postponed for three weeks a decision in the matter. So September 25 was fixed as the date for another hearing.

In the meantime, Manager Donald C. Egbert was instructed to have a detailed survey of the sewer situation on both streets made, including such items as depth of basement in relation to depth of sewer, and basements have been flooded and when; and individual lot costs for each property owner.

Using as Exhibit A the fact that in nearly two months less than a third each of WPA sewer work on Rivenoak and Madison avenues has been completed, those present pointed out that WPA work on Rivenoak and Madison avenues would, if started in the near future, keep residents on those streets in plenty of mud and cold water all winter.

As the result of Monday night's meeting the City will probably increase the amount of sewer survey and report of all future sewer projects, thus placing themselves in a better position to handle public hearings.
