Finest Teachers Attracted By New Plan, Speaker Says

"Teacher tenure attracts the best and finest teachers to a school system," was the message brought to the Birmingham system by George G. Wright, principal of Condon Intermediate School of Detroit.

"It is a fine thing for the children, the parents, the teachers and the administration," continued Mr. Wright. "You want people who have a feeling of security teaching your children, people who are not afraid. Teacher tenure brings those people to a system and helps keep them there."

Law is Superior
Mr. Wright was introduced by Mrs. Edward L. Bryant, formerly of Birmingham and now of Ann Arbor, state education chairman of the Michigan League of Women Voters. Mrs. Bryant explained the stand of the state League supporting teacher tenure as a natural sequence of the stand of the National League of Women Voters in support of the merit system for all governmental employees.

"Mandatory state legislation prior to 1937 provided for two requirements of an ideal merit system for Michigan public school teachers," said Mrs. Bryant. "In that year the state legislature passed the third requirement when it passed the Teacher Tenure Act, but made its adoption by local school districts optional rather than compulsory. With this exception, our law is ideal in every respect, being superior to similar laws in other states, notably California."

"Our Michigan Teacher Tenure Act, when adopted by a local district, cannot force a teacher from her job, any more than a malicious gossip peddler can."

Mrs. H. W. Shepard and her two children have returned to their home on Concord road following a Florida sojourn.

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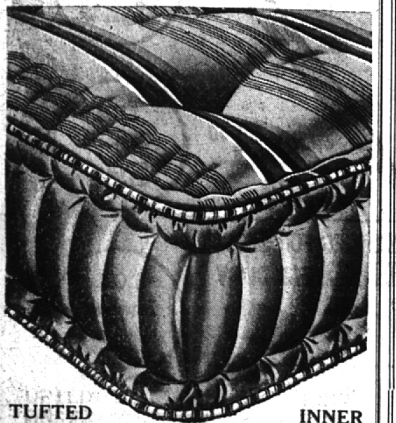
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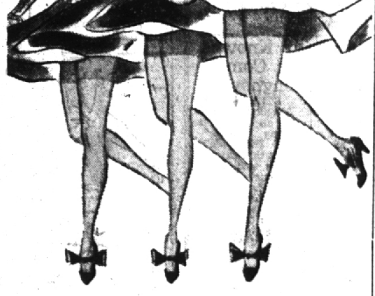
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
