Selfridge Field Open Saturday, April 6 For Army Day

Selfridge Field will be open to the public, Saturday, April 6, for annual Army Day. There will be considerable flying during the day consisting of military formations, dropping of parachutes, pass-by reviews and the like. The Post will be open to the public from 10:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. All hangers, barracks, and the parachute department will be open for inspection. Displays will be prepared by the following departments: Quartermaster—This will consist of clothing and government equipment. Weather—Will include all of the facilities used by the weather department for forecasting and passing the information on to the pilots. Communications—Two-way radio sets used in airplanes, ground equipment, etc. Ordnance—Hand grenades, signal pistols, automatic rifles, machine guns and different types of bombs. Flight surgeon—Latest types of military medical equipment to be used on ground and installed in airplanes. Airplanes—One of each type of airplane now at Selfridge will be placed in a hangar. Stiles leading up over the wing will be erected so that people may walk up and look in the cockpit. There will be a pilot in each ship to explain all that he can about the ship.
