

Gardeners' Corner

ORIENTAL POPPIES
This is the period when oriental poppies are dormant and can be moved. *Beauty of Loveliness* is dark red. *Royal Scarlet* is not so dark. *Perry's White* is white with a crimson spot. *Gold of Ophir* is light orange. *Perry's Blue* is pale pink fading to white. *Enchantress* is lilac rose.

BEARDED IRIS
Transplant and divide Bearded Iris.

AUTUMN CROCUS
The Autumn Crocus also known as Meadow Saffron or, using its latin name, *Colchicum* is an interesting plant. It should be planted from now on until September. Plant the bulbs in well prepared soil (rather sandy). The tips of the bulb should be 2 or 3 inches below the surface. The plants bloom without foliage so it is a good plan to plant the bulbs where another plant may supply the necessary ground cover. They will do in the rock garden or in the front of a border. They prefer sun and look best in masses. *Colchicum autumnale* is the best known. It has rose purple flowers or pure white. *Cespeianum* is also easily obtainable. It is more rose in color and is a leafy course looking plant.

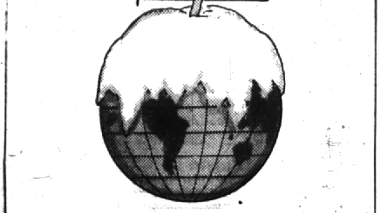
PRUNING
Prune privet hedges for the last time. It is already too late for other pruning. Cutting stimulates new growth and the young leaves and twigs will come out uncolored and will become sufficiently hardy to winter.

TARRAGON VINEGAR
Tarragon may be cut and placed in a jar of your favorite vinegar. A handful to a quart. Place the jar in the sun. The warmth will brew your vinegar. Bring it to a boil. Strain. Leave the tarragon in the bottle.

HERBS
Herbs should be gathered for drying just as they are coming in from the direct rays of the sun or they will lose their color. Do not let them get moist. Once dry they should be placed in an air tight container.

City Will Cancel Water Agreement

A contract with Judson Bradley providing an exchange of water service if needed in an emergency between Birmingham and Bloomfield Village subdivision will be cancelled at the end of 60 days, the City Commission decided Monday night.

The agreement was entered into in 1927 when Birmingham moved its water tank. At that time, a connection with Bloomfield Village provided the necessary standpipe pressure until the move was completed. On one occasion, when Bradley's water pump was shut down, the Village used Birmingham water, although it is said that Bradley now has an agreement with Oakland Hills Country Club.

Because Birmingham wells do not quite supply enough water to maintain standard pressure when the peak demand comes during hot days, it was decided to suspend the agreement.

Bus Driver Quick To Put Out Fire

Bus drivers are supposed to be quick-thinking men, and one of them, Fred C. Nugent, 151 E. Maplehurst, Ferndale, employed by Eastern Michigan Automobiles, demonstrated his alertness in a pinch yesterday.

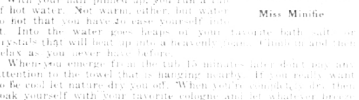
SYMBOLS OF DEFEAT?

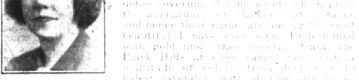
