**Bulb Orders**

The emphasis this fall will be on daffodils and bulbs other than tulips. There is still some hope that the Dutch bulb shipments will arrive, but the tulips are not included in the advance lists from bulb dealers and we are promised a later list if importation is possible. There are some American growers. They are in New York, Oregon and in our own state, Michigan. From them, the usual tulips carried by these growers in a list much shorter but not less tempting, than the importers' may be purchased at prices somewhat higher than last year. With the situation as it is, we may all like to take a closer look at the daffodils available, and see what other native bulbs may be substituted for tulips.

**Dwarf Daffodils**

Small gardens and rock gardens can often hold clumps of miniature daffodils where the full sized flowers would be out of place. One has an amusing name—Hoop Petticoat, botanically *Bulbocodium*. The golden yellow one is *Conchocallis*, the white one *Monophyllus* and sulphur yellow *Citrus*. The *Triandrus* species, familiarly known as Angel's tears, has longer petals, and is worth while for a special spot. Another dwarf daffodil is the *Cyclamineus*, known as *Cyclamineus*.
