We never had any preponderance of this world's goods. We were just comfortably well off, but we did own a dozen sterling silver teaspoons, beautifully engraved, a wedding gift. We had a few nice trinkets, as most families do, and these were usually in a desk, but we had no valuable documents, we didn't keep a vault at the bank. There was a heavy black tin fireproof box and in this mother kept some bonds and the mortgage papers, her grandmother's coin earrings and gold found on her pen and a ruby pin that had been in the family for several generations and was really valuable. But the silver teaspoons! These were the greatest treasure and were never taken out of their thick grey flannel case except on special occasions.

Mother had a habit of hiding them in the most unbelievable and inaccessible places and when guests were coming or there was to be a party she would begin to hunt for the teaspoons a week before and have everyone else looking. Never at any time did she remember where she had last put them. It was a family feud. She would get up in the middle of a meal to look in some remote place that had come to her mind and if ever we saw her looking respectful, we dared not speak, lest she be on the very brink of remembering.

I recall several important occasions when they could not be found and old old ones had to be shined up and made to do. There was a time when they were lost for almost a year. Mother was certain then that they had been stolen, and yet she thought that somehow some day they would come to light and proceed constantly that they would. When finally they did turn up in the bottom of a bureau of disassembled garments in the attic, she said it was an answer to prayer. Thereafter she always put them in the back of her bottom dresser drawer so that they never again were lost.
