Encourage Business Growth!

The United States today desperately needs two things: JOBS and PRODUCTION. We need jobs to rebuild faith in our nation and in the democratic way of life. We need production to rebuild our national defenses, to restore our people's incomes and to win financial security. This is because people who should be busy investing are reluctant to

invest in a business unless it is growing from within through reinvested earnings. Such growth of assets out of earnings is necessary to give a margin of security to creditors and added confidence to stockholders. Owner-executives, moreover, want their own stake in the firm to keep pace with the increase in claims of new investors upon the company's assets and earnings. Otherwise they may find themselves losing control of the business. Therefore, the average busi-

ness can expand rapidly only if it is able to reinvest a sizeable amount of its profits—if any. It is repugnant to our sense of justice that individuals should grow fat on war profits or armament expenditures. Rising taxes on personal incomes can and must be used to prevent this and to raise revenues necessary to meet costs of our new armaments. But to the efficient, well-managed business which has shown its ability to make good use of its capital should go every opportunity and encouragement to put back earnings into creating new jobs and producing more of the things this nation needs. To this end we should reduce rather than increase taxes on profits, large or small. As new taxes are needed they should fall, not on productive capital, but on personal incomes—dividends, salaries and wages. In this way we can best increase the tools for expanding production and at the same time decrease that demoralizing inequality between men-at-arms and men-at-work.
