**State Civil Service Needs Typists**

The State Civil Service Commission is now looking for 150 typists and stenographers to fill positions in the state service which are vacant or filled by temporary employees. Most of the present vacancies are in branch offices and must be filled by residents of the county or district in which the office is located.

Announcements of examinations for Typist Clerk C and Stenographer Service Applications will be posted in the county clerk's offices and in the offices of the State Employment Service. Application forms may be obtained from these offices or by writing to the State Civil Service Commission, Lansing. Candidates must have had courses in typing or stenography.

These positions offer a starting salary of \$20 per month and opportunities for promotion to higher paying positions in the same or related lines of work. Among the related positions are account clerk, bookkeeping machine or key punch operator, hearing stenographer and fingerprint clerk.

Opportunities for male typists and stenographers are especially good. Many of the positions in the State Police and Corrections Departments can be filled only by men. In the past it has been found difficult to secure a sufficient number of qualified men to fill these positions.

Candidates will first be given a written examination to determine their knowledge of office practices and clerical routines. Those who are successful in the written examination will be given performance tests in typing or shorthand.

**ORDINANCE NUMBER 206**  
CITY OF BIRMINGHAM  
AMENDMENT TO ZONING ORDINANCE

The City of Birmingham Ordinance No. 221 is amended by adding thereto a section to be known as Section 241, to read as follows:

Section 241  
41. Property described as Lots 1 to 3 inclusive of the Henry Means Re-subdivision of Inglewood Farms Subdivision shall be zoned as follows: Re-subdivision of Business A District to Single Family Residential.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon publication after the passage thereof and shall be subject to the Commission of the City of Birmingham, the 25th day of August, A. D. 1940.
