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Rev. Jos. Dutton Tells Lions of European Union

A digest of the recently presented proposal for a federal union of the 15 leading democracies was given Wednesday noon when the Rev. Jos. Dutton of Ann Arbor, a retired minister, was in Birmingham during 1920, 1921 and 1922, spoke to members of the Lions Club.

Founding of the Inter-democracy Federal Unionists was in the publication in March, 1939, of Clarence K. Street's book "Union Now." Street, a World War veteran and a newspaper correspondent for 19 years, the last 10 years covering the League of Nations at Geneva.

It is the idea of the United States constitution, the speaker pointed out. The United States is the only nation in the world in the same way that is being suggested for the union of the democracies.

There could be no war against this powerful union, Mr. Dutton pointed out, because 95 per cent of practically every essential war material would be controlled by the democracies.
