

New \$12,000 Well Plans Authorized

A new well on the Lincoln avenue site was tentatively approved by the City Commission, Monday evening. It will replace the older of two deep wells which are now a main source of water in Birmingham.

City Manager Donald C. Egbert reported the old well is falling in its service, apparently because of gravel filling in around the well.

The hole will be a foot in diameter and probably 160 feet deep. Water is pure enough to be used without filtering or treatment of any kind, although it contains much iron and calcium.

In addition, a test will be made on the 66-acre disposal plant property to see whether at some future date the city can draw upon the subterranean sources of water there.

In regard to the need of a water system along both sides of Hunter boulevard, the Commission agreed that the time to make plans is the present, rather than to wait until driveways have been built, and private water extensions put in.

Big Main Contemplated. It is contemplated that at some future date, the City will have a big 12-inch main paralleling the east side of the theatre site. It is planned to lay a six-inch main from East Maple to Bowers. Egbert was authorized to make estimates at once on the cost of this project, with the end in view of securing WPA labor.

It was also pointed out at the meeting that there is talk of the construction of a new gasoline station at the southwest corner of Hunter boulevard and Maple.
