

# Race Hatred As Cause of War Will Be Topic for A. A. U. W. Meeting

## Wayne Professor is Guest Speaker At this Conclave

Arrangements have been made for Dr. George Leckler of the department of anthropology and ancient art at Wayne University, to be the guest speaker at the meeting of the Birmingham branch of the American Association of University Women to be held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Community House.

"Race Hatred As a Cause of War" will be discussed at this time by Dr. Leckler, who is a graduate of the University of Berlin and who received his Ph. D. degree at the University of Halle at Halle, Germany for a number of years he was assistant director of the Tell-Hafuf Museum and editor of a journal of Prehistory.

Dr. Leckler came to this country three years ago, leaving Germany before he could be rearrested and confined in a concentration camp for holding political views not in accord with the Nazi party. He plans to devote the major portion of his lecture to a discussion of race and race hatreds but will tell of his personal experiences abroad at the close of his address.

Mrs. Charles J. Shain will report on the conference on the cause and cure of war which she recently attended in Washington. This conference is an annual congress of delegates from 11 women organizations, among them the American Association of University Women.
