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War Relief Work Continuing Here

Red Cross production is continuing in Birmingham and Bloomfield Hills, both workrooms in operation on Tuesdays, one in the Community House and the other in Christ Church Cranbrook.

Plans for production in the county were made Monday at the regular executive committee meeting of the Oakland Chapter held at Pontiac. Garments will be made for local distribution as well as for the present emergency in Europe.

It was also announced that donations for Finnish relief for the disaster in Turkey, and for relief in Poland will be accepted by the Red Cross. They may be mailed to the Red Cross chapter headquarters at 12 Seneca street, Pontiac, or to Mrs. H. H. Corson in Birmingham.

Reports from Norman H. Davis, chairman of the American National Red Cross, regarding relief for Europe, state that \$250,000 has been allocated by the Red Cross for aid in Finland. A similar amount had been previously set up for relief in Poland as well as smaller allocations to the Red Cross societies of England, France and non-believers which have assumed the responsibility of harboring refugees. The Red Cross has sent two physicians to Finland. Thousands of garments and surgical dressings have also been sent to Europe.
