## Another Thrilling Contest Is Seen for Henry Ford High Return Game

### St. Mary's Tilt Ends 38-20 in Maroon's Favor

This week, Friday, the Maple Leafs play a return engagement with the Henry Ford Trade School team. In one of the most thrilling cage games of the season, the Maples defeated the Ford team 28-25 in the local gymnasium Jan. 12. Inaccurate shooting by a fast St. Mary's Orchard Lake basketball team helped Birmingham's undefeated forces win 38-20 last Friday.

In seven games the team has scored 250 points for a game average of 35 points. The team has held opponents to no more than 172 points for an average of 25 points a game. While doing this the team has turned in 247 points, 127 of which do not include the Alumni game which was also won by the local lads 39-30.

The battle for individual honors is still a two-man race between John McDougal and Dick Gilbert. John is leading at present by 11 points. 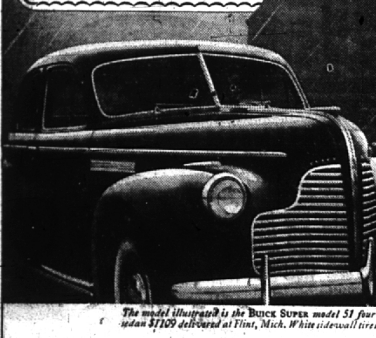
