Indian Exhibition on View At Detroit Art Institute

The Detroit Institute of Arts has just opened an Exhibition of Pueblo Indian Art. Colors of Tribal Silverwork which will continue on view through Aug. 11. The 32 paintings and over half a hundred pieces of silverwork from Southwestern United States, which are being shown in this exhibition, were given to the museum in 1934 by the noted collector of American Indian arts, Amelia Elizabeth White of Santa Fe, N. Mex.

Outstanding objects are the belt and the dance headdress, both with turquoise and the necklaces with crescent pendants. The earlier pieces are of silver alone, only more recently has turquoise been extensively used, and of late commercially cut and polished stones.
