Greek Theatre Perfect Background For Pontiac Orchestral Program

Less than a year ago one of the most outrageous men that ever came to Pontiac arrived in our sister city, to the north from Los Angeles. This amiable gentleman, Cesar Chantone, whipped into shape the first Symphony Orchestra ever organized by Pontiac and Tuesday evening directed the first of four concerts at the lovely Greek Open Air Theatre at Cranbrook.

With this beautiful setting under the stars a delightful program of Mozart, Beethoven, Saint-Saens and Strauss was played to a large and appreciative audience. The attack of the orchestra was lacking in instrumentation and having many young, inexperienced players and being new, it is surprising that such an excellent quality of work could be produced.

The attack of the orchestra was excellent and as a whole the orchestra responded in splendid manner to the baton of Mr. Chantone. As time goes on he will not have to labor with the orchestra as was evident in the performance, but being in the creative stage this becomes necessary.

When mention was made of an orchestra for Pontiac the matter was not taken too seriously. Like most industrial cities there is the quest for novelty. However, it seems that the destined time is here and as much if not more than any person who has ever done anything for Pontiac.

Tax Payers Get Dividend

An angle that must be noticed is the fact that many of the young players of the orchestra are products of the school system of Pontiac and have been trained under able director, Dale C. Harris, who makes the best hand in the state. This new orchestra is something the tax payers can call their own.

Noted in the orchestra was that grand old institution, William Leggett, a teacher in his early eighties, playing the viola with as much vigor as any of the youngsters. It is nice to know that this man has had a beneficent influence on the lives of many young musicians. With his years abroad and his knowledge of music and literature it is a pleasure to see a man

who goes forward ignoring the age and the passing of time as millions have done.

Courage seems to be the dominant quality of this new orchestra and this reviewer hopes that it becomes one of the outstanding institutions of this county to which it belongs.
