Seniors Enjoy Skip Day at Put-in-Bay

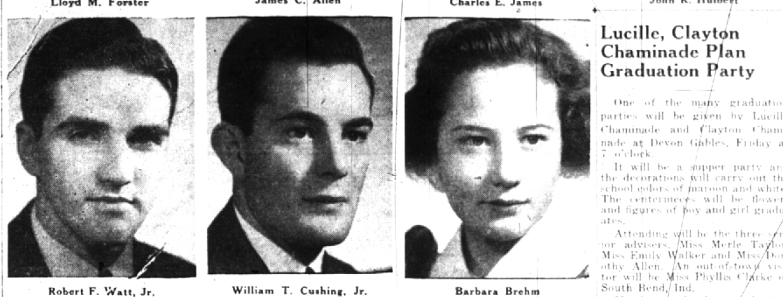

Display of the flag Friday has been suggested by Richard E. Dewey, commander of Birmingham's American Legion post, in honor of Flag Day. In calling attention to the annual celebration, Dewey said: "Following the flag-raising ceremony at the opening baseball game this spring one man remarked, 'The sight of the flag of my country rising to the top of that flagpole brought out more than the usual emotion. I guess with the world being what it is, I'm more appreciative than ever of my country.'" Most American citizens during the past few months have undoubtedly given expression to a similar sentiment. On all sides we are reminded of the blessings of life in the United States. And so it seems particularly appropriate that this year the schools should again participate in the annual observance of Flag Day, a day that is set aside to foster reverence for the flag of the United States, and to spread understanding and appreciation of the ideals and institutions for which the flag stands. The date, June 14, is selected for the observance because the flag of the United States was first authorized by the Continental Congress in Philadelphia on June 14, 1777. It is the anniversary of this date that is now observed as Flag Day throughout the Nation. Flag Day is the final, culminating day for the activities of Flag Week, June 8-14.
