But this week as she sat talking land in the lap of budget safety—all over that her childhood dreams had been blasted. For the United States is the place to live and to bring up your children, she told me. And besides, her husband, being sales manager of the Detroit Edison company in Detroit, does have something of a diplomatic job, she believes.

Don't Forget America Mrs. McLay comes of a long line of public figures and is a sister of Henry A. Wallace, Secretary of Agriculture. Does she get down to Washington often to visit? I asked.
"I'm always dropping in unexpectedly," she flashed back at me. When in the capital she divides her time between the Wallaces and a sister, Mrs. Charles Bruggman, whose husband is Swiss minister to the United States.
Two boys and a girl round out the McLay household. Angus and Annabelle were in school while I visited with their mother this week. But before I left Wallace, a husky, red-haired boy of high school age came in and contributed to a three-way conversation. He augments the evidence of his mother's statements on the possibility of a United States of Europe and the language and racial problems that appear to be Europe's downfall.

Although affairs abroad seem by their very horror to consume the spotlight, now is not the time to lose sight of our problems here at home. Mrs. McLay begged me to relay to you. There are still child welfare problems, there still remains unemployment and a housing situation. These problems, can't be forgotten because a war is raging across 3,000 miles of ocean. The problems that will be solved only when everyone is aware of their acuteness, she believes.
