

St. Dunstan's Guild Set for 'Three-Night Stand in Open Air Theater

Mid-Summer Night's Dream to Be Vehicle for Annual Public Show

Few amateur organizations in the country are as fortunate as St. Dunstan's guild in Bloomfield Hills in having so beautiful and artistic a setting for their productions as the Greek theater, Cranbrook.

As has been its custom for the past several years, the Guild's annual June performance, which is open to the public, will be presented on this unique outdoor stage, which has three openings at the back, through which a vista of garden and pool may be glimpsed by the spectators. The dates are Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings and the play, Shakespeare's "Mid-Summer Night's Dream."

The amphitheater, which seats about 500 persons, was completed in 1916 and the first production given there was the "Cranbrook Masque," written by Sidney Howard. Many of the Hills residents, interested in amateur theater, were in the cast and a few professionals, including Irving Pichel, now of the movies, and Constance Binney, Sam Hume, who now heads the dramatics department of the University of California, was the director.

Other similar productions and charity performances were given at the Greek theater from time to time and four or five years ago St. Dunstan's started using it for its big annual show.

The theater was especially designed for that particular spot at "Cranbrook," the George G. Booth estate, and each detail of the building is so planned that it is used out with the utmost care. The acoustics are so good, that no loud speaker system is necessary, the voices of the actors carrying clearly to all parts of the theater. Portable lighting equipment is used for evening performances—equipment which affords the maximum of lighting efficiency.

The Thursday family night entertainment at Pine Lake starts tonight. The hour of special entertainment, designed to amuse the children particularly, will include ventriloquism, magic and a puppet show. It will be held outdoors, weather permitting, starting at 8 o'clock.

There will be a dinner-dance Saturday night at the club, with a popular band providing the music. Floor show entertainment will be furnished by a group of singers.

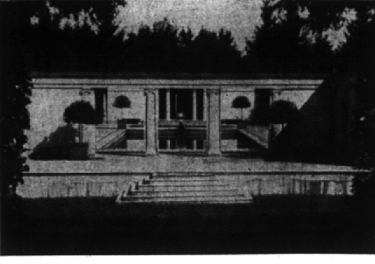
Junior Girls Sail

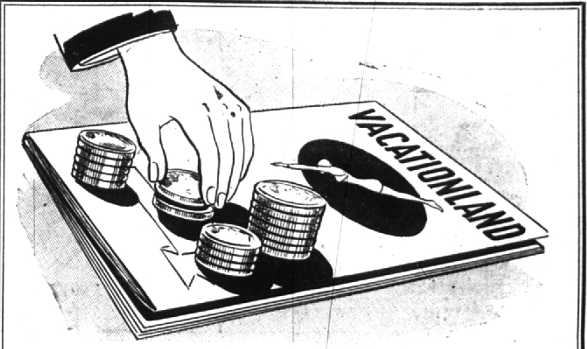
