Recent gifts to the Baldwin Public Library include books covering a wide variety of subjects.

The City of Detroit, Michigan, through the generosity of the late Mrs. Frank L. Klinger, has made a valuable addition to the library's collection of books on the history of the city.

Three of the five volumes trace the long history of Detroit and Wayne county from the earliest prehistoric mound builders through the Indian and Revolutionary days to 1922 of the modern industrial era.

The remaining volumes, as well as a three-volume supplement, are devoted to biographical sketches of prominent Detroiters.
