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Symphonic Records to be on Sale Each Tuesday at Community House

Due to the demand of Birmingham music lovers for further opportunity to buy the \$1.50 complete symphonic recordings, the Michigan Committee for Music Appreciation has announced a one-day-a-week sale at the Community House. The day is Tuesday and records will be on sale every Tuesday beginning next week, until further notice.

This distribution center was arranged under the direction of the Birmingham Musicale, and makes it possible to secure these records without going into Detroit. Centers have also been established in Flint, Saginaw, Kalamazoo, Grand Rapids, Lansing and Ann Arbor, according to Mrs. Edith Rhett Tilton, state chairman.

Mrs. D. L. Tate, president of the Musicale, has loaned a phonograph to the Community House, so that prospective customers wishing to hear the records before purchasing, may do so.

If the names of the orchestras and conductors appeared on the records, the cost would be from \$6 to \$10. However, in order to promote interest in the world of music, America's most famous orchestras waived all of their royalties and profits. They stipulated that the records be sold only through public service organizations, schools and civic groups.

Included in the list of records available are Schubert's Unfinished Symphony; Beethoven's Symphony No. 5 and Symphony No. 9; Mozart's Symphony No. 40; Wagner's Ring of the Nibelungen; and Parsifal; Bach's Brandenburg Concertos No. 2 and 3; Debussy's "Afternoon of a Faun"; Liszt's "Les Preludes"; Haydn's "Symphony No. 99"; Tchaikovsky's Symphony No. 4; Brahms' Symphony No. 2; Franck's Symphony in D Minor; Tchaikovsky's Nutcracker Suite; Samuel Costanzo's distinguished music critic, chose these masterpieces as the most outstanding in musical history. Each set includes one of three, four or five double-faced records. The three and four record sets are \$1.99, and the five record set sell for \$2.98. Due to the great length of Franck's composition, the set has been divided into two sets of three each, at a cost of \$1.50 per set.

There has never been a more splendid opportunity to build a great musical library, according to Mrs. John S. Newberry, co-chairman with Mrs. Fred T. Murphy of the Michigan Committee for Music Appreciation.
